


Looking Back Moving Forward A Time of Reckoning JUNE 3, 2021

Equitable and Inclusive Leadership


Bianca Anderson and **Monisha Kapila** (ProInspire) will walk you through their soon-to-be published Leadership Model for Race Equity Impact that supports individuals and organizations in identifying how their practices can create and sustain race equity experiences and outcomes within the social sector. Explore how understanding inequities, aligning values, centering relationships, and sense of identity are core values for leaders to advance equity.

Organizational Transformation

Angela Park, consultant, researcher, and educator, will review key facets of the work to transform philanthropic organizations from the inside, to embed equity across your operations -- from internal policies and practices to organizational culture. She will highlight questions you should ask to bring an equity analysis to the internal actions and decisions you make and facilitate sharing and learning from each other.

Racial Justice Grantmaking

Lori Villarosa (Philanthropic Initiative for Racial Equity) will guide you in exploring key lessons informed by racial justice movement leaders and philanthropic change agents. This interactive session will clarify some of the core components of moving your grantmaking from a racial equity lens to a racial justice lens, including responding to resistance and effectively investing in movement ecosystem without inadvertently adding to sector inequities.
